UC San Diego's Division of Arts and Humanities, in collaboration with UC San Diego Extension International Programs, offers the International Academic Year **Abroad Program.** This program provides a nine-month study abroad opportunity for international students interested in exploring **US History, Culture, and Thought.** Gain access to resources from a world-renowned university, ranked #1 for six consecutive years by Washington Monthly for its contribution to the public good in three broad categories: Social Mobility, Research, and **Civic Engagement**. While enjoying the sunny Southern Californian climate and culture, learn from first-class professors in the fields of philosophy, history, music, theatre and dance, visual and performing arts, and literature.

Participation in the International Academic Year Program is administered through UC San Diego Extension's Concurrent Enrollment process. Students will receive an official Concurrent Enrollment transcript issued by UC San Diego Extension in late June/early July after completion of the program.

Program description:

- Study alongside American university students
- One academic year, Fall through Spring, of pre-selected courses from the Division of Arts and Humanities related to US history, culture, and thought.
- 12 credits (three 4-unit courses) per quarter to qualify for the F-1 student visa.
- Academic advising and student support, including study skills and writing skill development, and social opportunities.
- Universities in many countries count these credits towards their master's and bachelor's degree programs.
 Transferability is at the discretion of the home university and must be verified in advance by the student.

Courses and course descriptions are listed below by quarter.

Fall quarter courses (Sept. 14 - Dec, 10, 2016): Winter quarter courses (Jan. 4 - Mar 25, 2017):

- PHIL 162. Contemporary Moral Issues: Examine contemporary moral issues such as abortion, euthanasia, war, affirmative action, and freedom of speech.
- MUS 126 American Music: The Blues: Examine the development of the Blues from its roots in work-songs and the minstrel show, to its flowering in the Mississippi Delta. In addition, examine the development of Urban Blues and its close relations to Jazz, Rhythm and Blues, and Rock and Roll.
- HIUS 146. Race, Riots, and Violence in the U.S.: Examine the history of urban riots in the U.S. since the late nineteenth century. Explore how different groups of Americans have constructed competing notions of race, gender, labor, and national belonging by participating in street violence.

The courses listed above are prescribed courses for this program, but other selected upperdivision courses may be substituted with the permission of the student's advisor. For any substituted courses, students must take into consideration the consent of the instructor. course offering schedule, space availability, and the preparation of the student.

- PHIL165. Freedom, Equality, and the Law: Explore the concepts of freedom and equality, and how they have been understood and applied under the United States Constitution.
- VIS 100. Introduction to Public Culture: This course is about the expansion of contemporary visual arts practice into a field of environmental, architectural, and urban sites.
- LTEN 159. Contemporary American **Literature:** A critical examination of American literature across several genres and via other facets of US Culture produced since World War II.

- Spring quarter courses (Mar 30 June 16, 2017):
- TDHT 107. American Theatre: Examines representatiave plays and playwrights who write about the "American" experience from a variety of historical periods and diverse cultural communities.
- HIUS 141. Economic History of the US II: Assess the United States as a modern industrial nation. Emphasis is on the growth process, the social and political tensions accompanying expansion, and twentiethcentury transformations of American capitalism.
- XXXX 199. Directed Individual Study: Student will design and conduct an applied project within the San Diego region. Examples include gather and analyze survey or interview data, or participating in a regional historical project.

- Copy of transcripts in English for the four most recent semesters of academic studies. These transcripts must clearly indicate your excellent academic achievement top 10% in your school.
- Make sure to check the prerequisites for each class. To be eligible to enroll into classes all prerequisites must have been taken.
- A one-page statement explaining your reasons for choosing UC San Diego for your study abroad experience.

Tuition: \$27,500 USD

Tuition does not include required application fee or required quarterly student service fee, optional student recreation fee, books, optional library use fee, and required course lab fees. Please note that tuition does not include additional units over 12 units.
