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The Diaspora Community and Its Ties to Ancestral Home Land

- I) Introduction: some prefer to distinguish diaspora from the term immigrant communities even though in my opinion it s hard to draw a fine line between the two, since the reasons in most of the cases are similar to the numbers in both cases are usually huge and overall consequences and influences on new local communities, and on home land are quite similar.
- Ia) Influential causes and events leading to diasporas. Throughout history unfortunate events like wars, extreme natural conditions (desertification, floods etc), corrupted and brutal political systems (harsh socioeconomic conditions resulting in severe poverty etc.).
