#### Abstract [Times New Roman, 11 pt., Bold]

We ask authors to follow some simple guidelines. In essence, we ask you to make your paper look exactly like this document. The page format is A4, the text must be single column, line spacing -1.5, left margin -2.5 cm, right margin -2.5 cm, top margin -2.5 cm, bottom margin -2.5 cm, text Justified. This summary should be 200 - 300 words. An abstract is a shortened version of the paper and should contain all information necessary for the reader to determine: 1) topicality of the research, 2) the aim of the study, 3) methodology the study, 4) the results obtained and the most important conclusion, 5) the significance of the results. Please, do not use special characters, bullets and numbering symbols, reference citations, abbreviations in your title or abstract.

Keywords: 5-8 keywords in an alphabetic order (font Times New Roman 11 pt., Italic).

## **Introduction [Times New Roman, 14 pt., Bold]**

Length of the article must be 3000 to 7000 words, including figures, tables, and bibliography. The article should be prepared in English. The structure of the text of the article must generally have the following parts: Introduction, Methodology, Results, Discussion and/or Conclusions, References.

The introduction presents the problem and premise upon which the research was based. It goes into more detail about this problem than the abstract, justify the significance of the problem, provide an overview of previous research, and present the aim of the study. It can also include the theoretical framework, literature review etc., and can be titled differently accordingly to the topic.

Abbreviations should be defined the first time they appear in the article.

#### **Subsections [Times New Roman, 12 pt., Bold]**

Subsections can be added in the Introduction part or any other part of the article. The size of the manuscript limits their applicability.

#### References in the text [Times New Roman, 12 pt., Bold]

## Results [Sections - Times New Roman, 14 pt., Bold]

The Results section summarizes the data. Use tables and figures to display the main results.

#### Table and figure design [Times New Roman, 12 pt., Bold]

All drawings, tables and other non-text objects must be numbered. Insert figures and tables after they are cited in the text. Use reference to the Figures and Tables in the text (see Figure 1) or (see Table 1), even at the beginning of a sentence.



### Conclusions [Sections - Times New Roman, 14 pt., Bold]

Conclusions should be based on results and if possible, the solutions to the problem outlined in the introduction should be mentioned. Conclusions can be represented using plain text or separated by points using appropriate style.

- The conclusions do not contain references; they must be the author's conclusions.
- Do not leave hyperlinks formatting.

Include any grant/funding information if needed.
